6,000 acre feet for use in 1926. Once Hyatt Reservoir is filled, then water will be apportioned for two such seasons as 1926 in succession. Should be have three such seasons in succession Ashland Creek would probably be practically dry during the irrigation season and the only water available would be the small amount that could be obtained for storage from the winter flow.

If Ashland grows, it is going to need the entire summer flow of Ashland Creek for its domestic supply and if irrigation of small tracts within the city limits is to be continued, then water from another source must be provided for this use.

The recommendations made in the report must be taken collectively and not singly, in other words if the city should see fit not to purchase more storage from the Talent Irrigation District, then the conclusions drawn do not hold or at least must be severely modified.

John H. Carkin

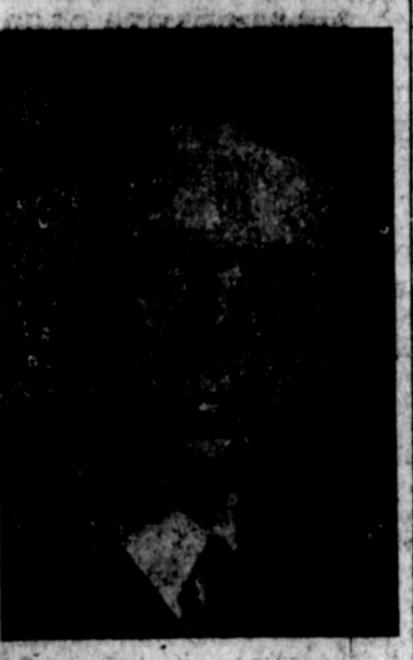
Candidate for Representative

Mr. Carkin was born in Bangor, Maine, in November, 1853, and moved west in the early '80's with his parents who were pioneers in the territory of Dakota before its admission to statehood. He was brought up on a farm attended public schools during the winters and worked his way in part through the Universities of Minnesota and North Dakota. He graduated from college and the law department of the University of North Dakota and was admitted to the North Dakota bar.

Mr. Carkin moved to Medford in 1908 where he has since farmed and practiced law. He has been city attorney for several years and owns an irrigated farm and orchard.

Mr. Carkin was a member of the 1913, 1923 and 1925 legislatures, being a member of the Ways and Means committee of the 1913 session and author of the state budget law. He was appointed by Governor Withcomb on the State Consolidation commission 1917-1919 was a member of the Special Tax investigation committee appointed by 1925 session and has at various times been a member of the important Ways and Means, Judiciary, Rules and other committees.

If elected Mr. Carkin will be the Speaker of the next House as he has 58 of the 60 Republican candidates to the lower house pledged to him. This will be the first time that Southern Oregon has had the honor since E. V. Carter was speaker in 1899.



Wm. M. Briggs

Candidate for Representative

Mr. Briggs was born in the city of Ashland, in 1896. He received his common and high school training in the public schools of Ashland, and his legal education at Valparaiso University, Indiana, from which he graduated with honors.

Mr. Briggs enlisted in the army in May, 1917, and at the close of the war was discharged with a commission as First Lieutenant of Infantry.

Returning home after the war, Briggs immediately turned his attention to the practice of law with his father at Ashland, under the firm name of Briggs & Briggs. He was admitted to the Indiana bar in 1917, and to the Oregon bar in 1919.

In 1919 Mr. Briggs was appointed city attorney of Ashland, and has held that position without interruption since that time, through various city administrations.

From 1920 to 1925 Mr. Briggs was Captain of the Ashland battery of Coast Artillery, and holds a Captain's commission in the Officer's Reserve Corps. During the period he was in command of the Ashland battery he was a member of the General Staff of the State of Oregon.

Mr. Briggs is making his first entry into politics, though he has given a great deal of service in civic matters through his work and interest in the various organizations of his locality.
