Why We Favor The Relocation of The County Seat

We, the undersigned, residents of Ashland, do hereby publicly express ourselves in favor of the relocation of the County Seat at Medford, and believe that the people of Ashland should return an overwhelming vote in favor of the proposed measure.

We believe that the relocation of the county seat should be favored by the voters on the basis of true economy, convenience for the greatest number of people, and the providing of protection for our priceless county records.

We believe that now is the time to make this change, as the old courthouse has served its period of usefulness, and a definite location for the county seat should be determined before permanent expenditures are made.

We know that the statements of the opposition in regard to the cost of a new courthouse must be exaggerated. If such statements were correct, the State of Oregon could not have built the magnificent Southern Oregon Normal, furnished it, graded the grounds and provided a library, at a cost of \$175,000.00. We further know that instead of a levy of ten mills (as claimed by the Jacksonville Committee) to provide funds to build a courthouse at the end of five years, that a maximum levy of one mill will be sufficient.

We believe in progress, and we believe to relocate the county seat at Medford is in line with development and progress.
