Verner Carson, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. S. Carson of Iowa street, has returned to Ashland after an absence of several months. He has been in Central America.

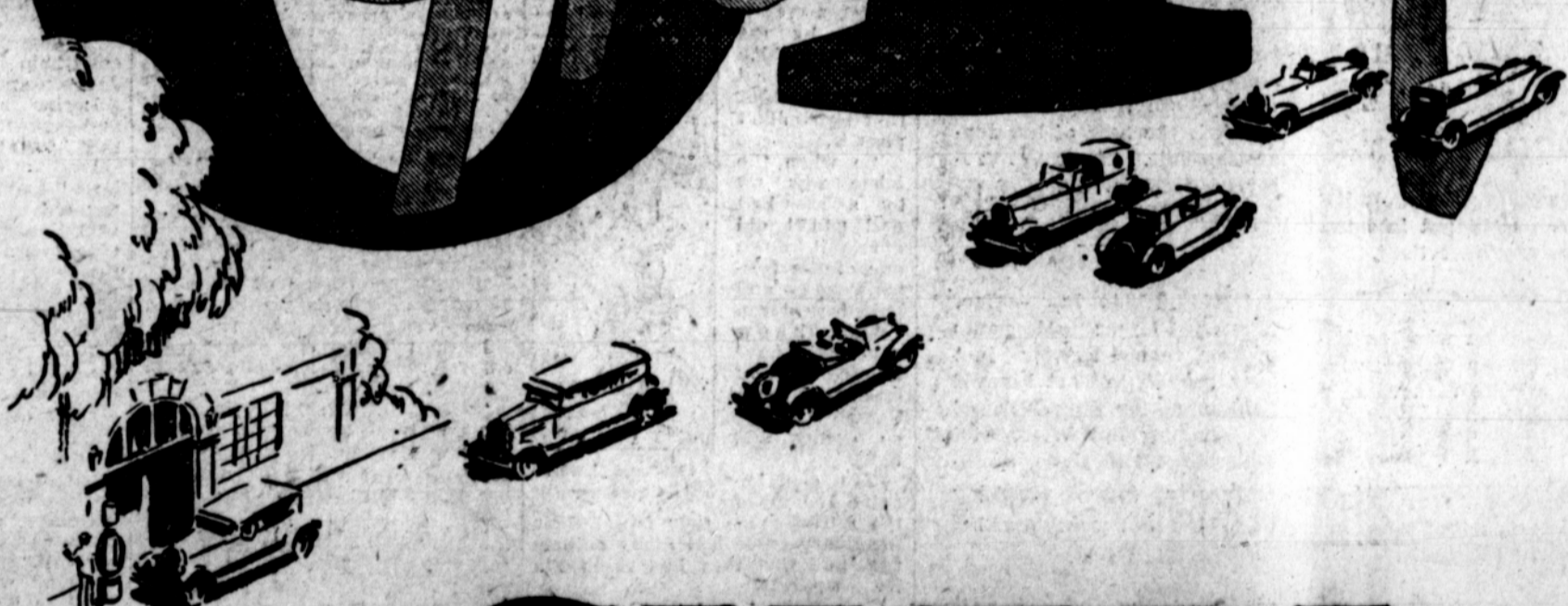
