WASHINGTON N.—A divorce in three and a half minutes!

This isn't a Reno or Paris record. At Arlington county courthouse (Va.) on the fringe of Washington, is perhaps the busiest divorce mill in the country. There are other mills throughout Virginia but none to equal Arlington county's, because that one is most conveniently situated with reference to ample supplies of raw material—big cities, like Washington and Baltimore.

The county is the smallest in the United States, which makes its enormous divorce mill all the more of a distinction. It grinds once a week, on Saturday, for four hours, during

CHINESE FAKE PASSPORTS IN ORDER TO ENTER HAVANA

HAVANA A.Cuba. (UP)—A new method of evading immigration laws was uncovered here when immigration officials discovered that 27 Chinese ostensibly Cuban residents returning to Havana after a visit in China, were travelling on false passports.

Investigation disclosed that the men had been furnished with passports of Chinese already re-

siding in Cuba, their photographs being pasted over the picture of the real owner.

As Cuban immigration laws prevent entry of Chinese immigrants and permits a Chinese resident to leave the island for not more than six months, it is believed that some of the Chinese residents here have been making a practice of "loaning" their passports to an agency in Hong Kong to be furnished would-be immigrants.

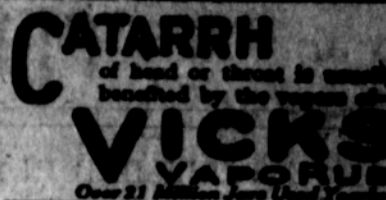
AMBULANCE BOXES PUT ON ENGLISH HIGHWAYS
