### Stewart's WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — Victor L. Berger seems likely to constitute the entire Socialist delegation in the next Congress.

There are a few other Socialist candidates for seats in the House of Representatives but Berger is the only one likely to win. He has his Milwaukee district pretty well sewed up.

There's a Socialist and a half, as Berger expresses it, in the present Congress. Fiorello H. La Guardia of New York City was elected on the Socialist ticket but Berger denies that he's Sinnfein.

La Guardia is as independent as they make 'em, but he always called himself a Republican until 1924, when, because he wouldn't stand hitched, his party organization refused him renomination for Congress.

Thereupon he ran as a Socialist and was elected.

This year, however, the Republicans of his district, profiting by the lesson of 1924, nominated him. Nominally he's a Socialist now, but, if re-elected, he'll be,

nominally, a Republican again. That will leave Berger alone in his glory.

Berger has a mighty good time in Congress and more influence than might be expected of a one or one-and-a-half man party.
