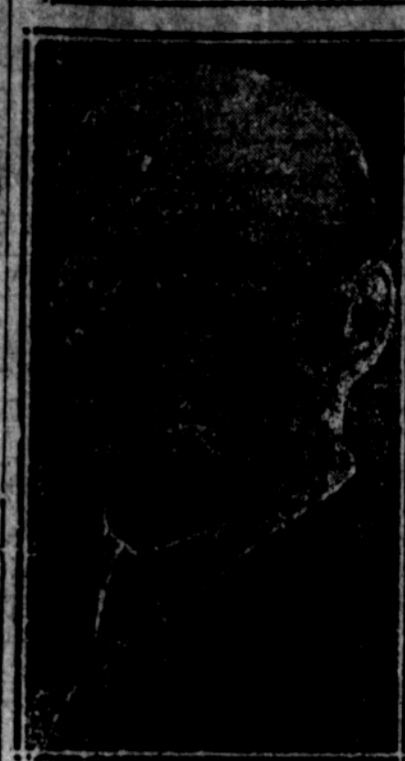

- 1 Tablespoonful Snowdrift
 - 2 Cupfuls Sugar
 - 2 Squares Chocolate
 - 1/2 Cupful Milk
 - 1/4 Teaspoonful Cream of Tartar
