

ONCE WEALTHY RUSSIAN NOW U. S. CITIZEN

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SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—
Vsevolod Yurovitch, who once was
the trusted financial agent of the
czar of Russia and who might even
have been a king himself had
been willing to plunge Asia in
blood, is now an American citizen,
rebuilding a great Russian industry
on American soil.

This man, to whom millions
were as small coins when the
Muscovites were advancing into

western Europe, has selected a
site on the Columbia river in
Oregon, and, in relying on a trade
learned in boyhood, will try to
make Siberian red caviar, the
prime delicacy of American
tables.

Joins Son
Yurovitch has just obtained his
full citizenship. He has gone
north to join his son, talking with
him the secret of the industry.

While Yurovitch was taking the
oath of allegiance here, Michael
Hreshchitsky, mystery general of
Siberia, who had failed to obtain
Yurovitch's influence with Ameri-
can financiers, was an exile in
southern Japan.

The influence that Hreshchitsky
sought was used by Yurovitch in-
stead for the purpose of showing
naturalization authorities that he
was a man of honor, fit to be a
citizen.

Among his credentials were

letters from two of New York's
greatest financiers.

Hunted Man

When revolution broke in Rus-
sia, 1917, Yurovitch had just
completed a trip to the United
States to purchase munitions.

In the time that it took to cap-
ture imperial train and imprison
the czar Yurovitch was stripped
of his fortune and became a hunt-
ed man.

His family was scattered, each
seeking escape by a different
route.

Fled to Siberia
Yurovitch fled to Siberia, into
Manchuria. He spurned offers of
help. He desired only to reach
America. While he traveled as a
refuge his name was presented to
Hreshchitsky, then in Vladivostok,
planning an invasion that would
sweep southern Siberia and the
Mongol territories and establish a
league of kingdoms extending

from the gulf of Tarsary
ward to Europe. Spats was
sent for Yurovitch, but he had
gone on through China to Ameri-
ca, uninformed of the efforts to
obtain his participation. If he
had in Peking that failure to see
Yurovitch and obtain his aid
blasted the hope of the White Rus-
sians for a "Mittel Asia." Hresh-
chitsky and 31 generals went to
Peking, ran afoul of international
intrigue and were interned in
1921.

There were dozens of ventures
that Yurovitch might have joined,
but he had an eye only for Ameri-
ca. His only comment upon be-
coming a citizen was: "It was
cheap at the price."
