PORTLAND MEN ARE HELD IN DEATH PROBE

Companions of Dead Woman Are Accused of Manslaughter

STRANGLED TO DEATH

Jurors to Inquire Into Drinking Orgy, Which Brought Death

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—(United News)—Involuntary manslaughter charges have been placed against James P. Hendricks and John K. Johnson following an inquest into the death of Mrs. Clara Dahl, whose body was found in an isolated district Tuesday morning.

It was determined that the woman died as a result of strangulation during an attack of nausea, caused by overeating and drinking.

Drinking Party

The two men are alleged to have been the woman's companions on a drinking orgy.

Police say the body had been moved to the place where it was found.

Johnson and Hendricks are at liberty under \$1,000 bail pending grand jury investigation.

Selkirk Writes More About Golf

A second article on golf was written this week by William Selkirk, golf instructor for the Ashland Golf and Country Club. This week he takes up the driver and manner of playing. His article follows:

A pleasing feature of golf is its flexibility. The basic style of play is by singles, two players contesting with each other. With a great degree of pleasure a solitary player can play the game, his goal in that case being to beat his own previous record. Then there may be a combination of three players. The most common manner of playing is the foursome. This means that a party of four forms a group for playing a match.

The variations in play are simply variations in the way of keeping and winning with the lowest score over 9 or 18 holes.

The Driver

A driver is a wood club, the face of which approaches nearest to the perpendicular of all wood clubs. Hence, in its contact with the ball it tends to produce a motion nearest to the horizontal and therefore productive of the greatest distance.

Now the easiest way to get your stance or addressing the ball is to draw a letter T, get equal distance space with your feet from leg of T, then leave your club flat in the crown of the T. This will keep your hands hanging straight down from the front of your body, left hand gripping snug two inches from the end of the handle and right hand loose under your left. Grip the club by your finger points, not the palm. Slacken your knees a trifle. This brings the equal weight on your heels and not the toes. Let your shoulders bend over toward the ball a trifle. Then make your club head swing on the T crown. This forms a pivot motion to the shoulders and hips. Practice and practice with your hand perfectly steady and your eyes glued to the spot where the ball rests. This advice keeps hands and mind working together.

Seattle Police Officer Kicks With Nicholas During Jaunt

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 6.—(United News)—An astonishing disregard for royalty has been shown by a Seattle policeman, one of the officers detailed to act as a personal guard to Queen Marie of Rumania during her visit here.

City Detective Robert R. Herbert was escorting Prince Nicholas through a crowd, holding him by the arm, while eager women pushed forward to present their cards to Queen Marie's son. The prince knocked the cards to the street.

Herbert, according to the story told by fellow officers Friday, asked the prince if he objected to the women's advances. Nicholas replied that he did.

"You must have a hard time getting along in the world with a disposition like that," remarked Herbert.

The royal party was shocked into silence by the officer's words. Nicholas, recovering from his astonishment, replied in good spirits: "I do."

This is one of the most constructive moves ever taken by this County, and will result in improved service to all the people as well as providing additional room for the various county offices so they can carry on their work more efficiently.

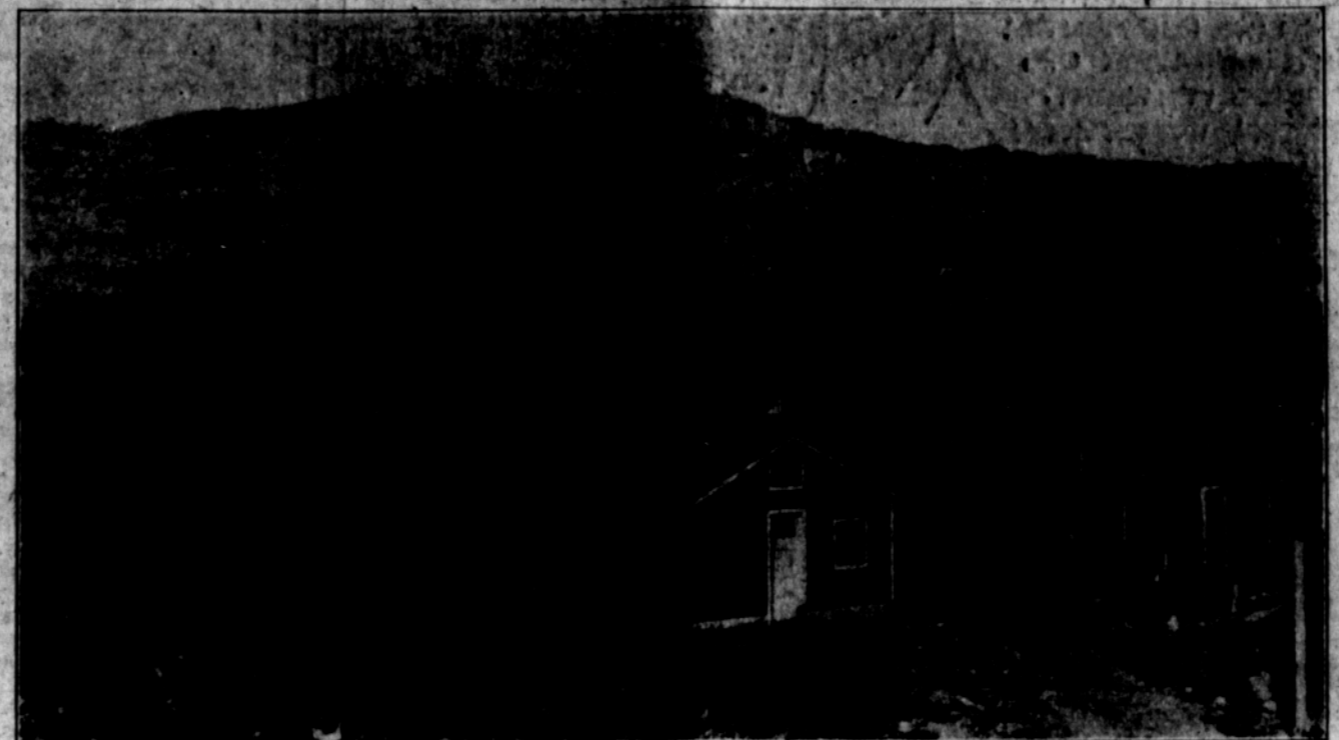

FAITHFUL SHERIFF TAKES SON-IN-LAW TO PENITENTIARY

"Golden Rule" Croxon Hunts Down Man Who Stole Funds

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Nov. 6.—(United News)—"Golden Rule" Jeremiah Croxon, California's oldest sheriff has brought his daughter's husband to San Quentin penitentiary and left him here to serve from one to ten years for embezzlement.

Croxon's fidelity to duty, which drove him from his home in Hollister to the Panama Canal zone in pursuit of his son-in-law, reached its climax Friday.

George T. Williams, after marrying Croxon's daughter, absconded with \$6,500 in county funds. Croxon's influence had given him a position of deputy tax collector.

"George proved himself the worst kind of criminal," said Croxon, as he left his prisoner here. "He deserted his wife and three year old son and left the country. It was my duty to bring him back and I did. There can be no reconciliation. My daughter's heart is broken."

REDUCTION IN TAXES SOUGHT BY PRESIDENT

Mr. Coolidge to Ask Congress to Lower Income Tax Payments

DEMOCRATS FAVOR IT

No Political Difficulties Foreseen in Executive's Proposal

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—President Coolidge expects to ask congress for an immediate tax reduction of probably 10 to 12 per cent of current federal income taxes.

announcement was made verbally tonight, through the White House spokesman. It will be presented formally to congress in the president's message when congress convenes early in December.

About 10 Per Cent

Democrats have publicly favored this. No political difficulties are in prospect. The exact amount of reduction is now being worked out, but the president expects it will be between ten and twelve per cent. It will apply to the federal income taxes, which were paid last March, or which are being made in quarterly payments this year.

This reduction is to be a sort of special dividends, applying only to taxes paid this year. It is not intended to permanently lower the income tax rates, until it is seen whether current prosperity and surplus revenues continue.

RAIL HEAD SILENT ON KLAMATH PLANS

Oregon Trunk President Says There is no New Development

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—(United News)—W. F. Turner, head of the Oregon Trunk railroad system, interviewed here tonight, regarding tentative plans for railroad development in Central Oregon after the arrival here of northern line officials, said that he had no comment to make.

Turner said that he knew nothing of any proposals to construct new lines immediately, and had no information except a news story published in a morning paper here.

Marine Officer Visits Ashland

Lieut. Johnson of the U. S. Marine Corps was in Ashland yesterday. Lieut. Johnson is stationed at Portland in charge of the marines assigned to the protection of the mails in that district, which includes the Portland-Ashland division of the Southern Pacific, and he came out yesterday on an inspection trip. Marines are now assigned regularly to all mail trains in and out of Ashland, their runs being from Portland to Ashland and return and San Francisco to Ashland and return, with a lay over here of one night.

HOLDING DOWN FRANC IS JOB OF FRANCE

Government Adopts Budget of Premier in Order to Stop Exchange Rise

PARIS, Nov. 5.—(United News)—Holding down the rising franc is the novel job that confronts the French government today. Premier Poincare told the finance committee of the chamber of deputies in asking quick action on his financial program.

Consequently the committee unanimously adopted the premier's budget which shows estimated receipts of 29,259,000,000 francs and estimated expenditures of 29,260,000,000 francs. The premier told the committee that the rapid rise of exchange was threatening to endanger the republic.

SENATOR M'KINLEY IS NOW NEAR DEATH

Indiana Solon Cannot Live More Than Few Weeks At Best

MARTINSVILLE, Ind., Nov. 6.—(United News)—Death of Senator William D. McKinley, who has been confined to a sanitarium for several months, is only a matter of weeks, according to Dr. Robert H. Egbert, superintendent of the sanitarium.

Dr. Egbert said that, in his judgment, Senator McKinley "might live for perhaps three weeks if no complications develop."

Senator McKinley was operated on in Baltimore last May for a stomach disease.
