Relations between France and Italy were uneasy and France again today formally protested to the Italian government against / anti-French manifestations in Africa frontier, in which fascists invaded French consulates or attacked Frenchmen.

Resulted in Plot

These manifestations resulted from Sunday's attempt to assassinate Premier Mussolini in Bolothat Frence has not shown proper diligence in discovering and foiling anti-Italian plots engaged in by expatriated Italians and others on French soil.

Last September, when a young anarchist named Lucetti threw a bomb at Premier Mussolini in Rome it was established Lucetti had lived in France and had crossed the frontier into Italy for the purpose of assassinating Il Duce. A vigorous Italian protest against permitting further plots to bud in France resulted in French governmental a c t i o n and other efforts to curb plots against Mussofini or his govern-

The Other Attempt Then came the Bologna attempt upon Mussolini's life and although Anteo Zamboni, the 15rear-old assassin, was not Frenc hand had never been in France, the incidents in Italian African colonies and along the
