GROWTH OF YMCA IN AMERICA RAPID

One the Y. M. C. A. in North America discovered its field, the men back of the movement immediately began to survey the situation and to departmentalize the work. Space does not permit commenting on the different departments of the work, nor the different movements inaugurated by the association. The following types or departments of work were soon undertaken as the need and field were discovered: Industrial work, for the men and boys in industries Railroad work for the men in the big railroad centers; Colored branches, for the negroes in the south and many places in the north; Indian work with the Indians on the reservations and in Indian school; County work, inaugurated by Robert Weidensal; Community work, inaugurated at the suggestion of F. A. Crosby, new Boy's Work secretary with the Northwest Council staff; the larger city type of work, which has grown to such magnitude; the Foreign work, which has reached to nearly every community with some phase of work; the high school work; which is reaching thousands of high school boys in America and other parts of the world the student department, which is reaching thousands of young men in the colleges of America and the world. The National Father and Son movement was started in 1909, the first Father and Son supper being held May 26, 1909, at Providence, Rhode Island. Other movements started by the association were, National Thrift Week, The Week of Prayer for Young Men, which will be observed in Ashland the week of November 14-20. These movements have spread out now till they are international in their scope, many Father and Son banquets being held in foreign lands.

There will be no change in the policies and management of the of the Seattle and Los Angeles Schumacher Wall Board Corporation as a result of the recent transaction in which some of the stock concern was acquired by interests outside the Schumacher family, according to word reaching Ashland from A. R. Molyan, vice-president and general manager.

With no capital available, however, manufacturing facilities of the corporation both at Seattle and Los Angeles will be added to and new markets will be entered on a considerably larger scale, Mr. Molyan said. "It is our opinion that our sales organization and distribution facilities in the Pacific Northwest and along the remainder of the coast can hardly be improved upon, and now we plan to develop the foreign markets intensively," the executive added. "So far as that end of the business is concerned, we already have an excellent start."
