

BRITAIN IS AFTER NEW POWER SOURCE

LONDON.—(United Press).—Alarmed at the continual dearth of coal the British public is casting around for substitutes. Alfred J. Liveredge, a well-known engineer, sums up the possibilities of the future:

1. Coal from China, "cheap as dirt," brought to Europe in "coal clippers" resembling the famous 'tea clippers' of an earlier day.

Chinese coal, he declares, is close to the surface and is easily mined by the cheapest labor in the world. The day may come when China will flood the world with coal at prices no one else can match.

2. The huge chalk cliffs of Great Britain may be burnt like coal, but they leave such an enormous deposit of lime of which only a trifling amount could be used for agriculture that chalk is not considered practical.

3. Dr. Diesel's theory that mankind might grow oil-bearing plants which could be used for fuel.

4. Sir Charles Parsons, Bt., famous inventor of the Parson's turbine, told the British Association for the Advancement of Science, that we might get all the heat we needed drilling a big hole into the crust of the earth; he thought twelve miles would be deep enough.

5. Steam from the center of the earth, such as Italy already has.

6. Atomic power, as envisaged by Sir Oliver Lodge. While the theory seems perfectly sound the mechanical difficulties have thus far proved insuperable.

7. The electrical engineer, A. A. Campbell Swinton has interested scientists with his contention that the electro-magnetic waves from the sun will some day be converted into heat just as a portion of them are now being used in wireless telegraphy.

9. "White coal," or waterpower. This the author regards as practicable but says that Great Britain in this respect, as in oil, can not compete with other countries enjoying a more abundant supply.

10. Tides,—here is the cheapest possible source of power available in the near future to Great Britain. "No other country is so fortunately situated as Great Britain in respect to tidal power; using it freely and expertly we can once again compete for the markets of the world."

Suicide Squad Loses Another

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—(United News)—Another of the "suicide squad," that group of men who gave themselves to medical science during the Spanish American war in order that doctors might experiment with malaria and tropical fevers and other diseases, has passed on.

He was Sergeant William M. Cutler of Chicago, who has died a martyr to science.

Cutler was one of the first to volunteer as a member of the "suicide squad" and it was that sacrifice, during which he allowed himself to be inoculated with malaria germs, various fevers and other scourges that finally resulted in his death.

Doctors said death was due to an inoculation of typhoid malarial germs. While the disease was fought off at the time it had attacked the valves of the heart and had left a permanent blight.

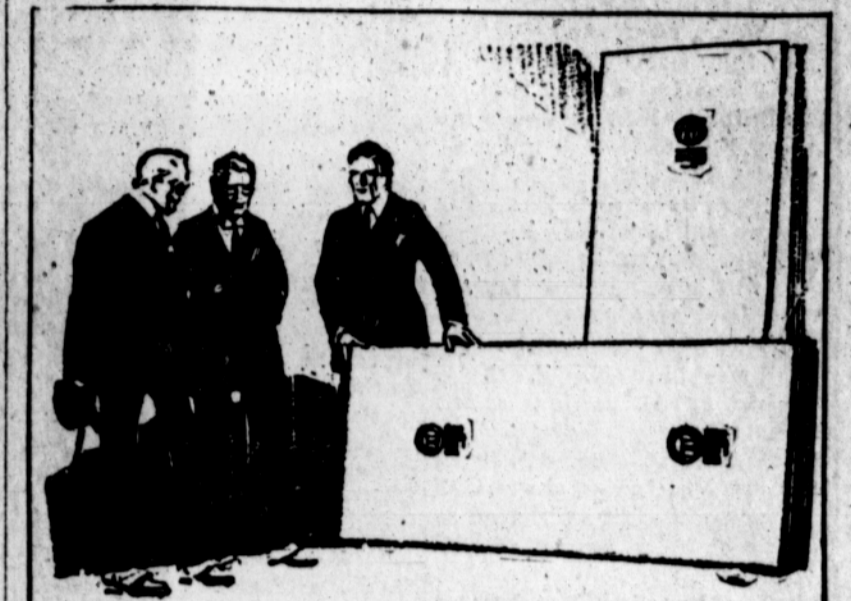

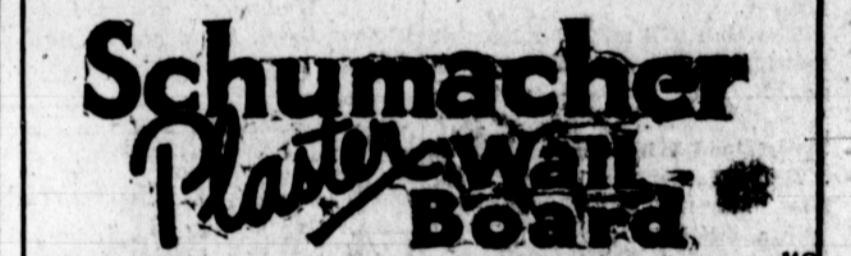

Recklessly he bit into a second. It also was good. But how could he be sure the merchant was not cheating on those that remained.

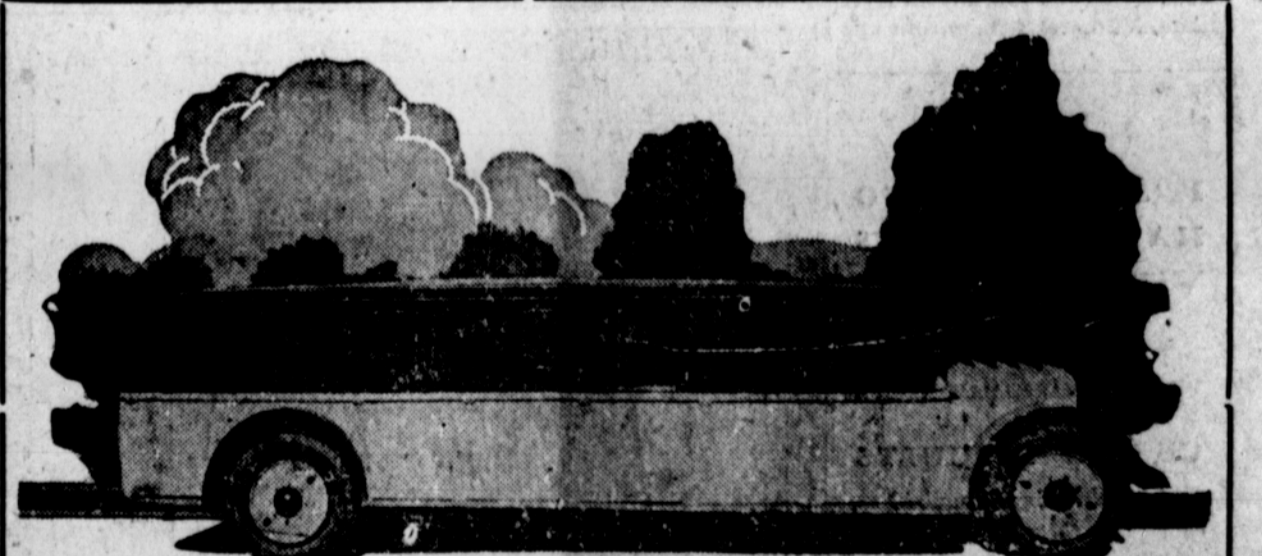
