6 Tablespoons Snowdrift  
3 Cups Flour  
6 Teaspoons Baking Powder  
1/4 Teaspoon Salt  
1 Cup Milk  
3 Tablespoons Grated Cheese

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut Snowdrift into the flour with a knife, add cheese. Add liquid to make a soft dough. Roll out on a slightly floured board to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut with a biscuit cutter. Put on a greased pan or baking sheet and bake in a very hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 to 12 minutes.
