

### HOTEL MAN TAKES STATE WIDE TRIP

Completing a trip that took him into practically every city of any size in the State of Oregon, R. W. Price, owner of the Linton Springs Hotel, and director of the Crater Lake National Park Company, operators of the Lodge and Transportation system, arrived in Ashland yesterday enthusiastic over the wealth of scenic wonders, and natural resources, which were seen on this trip.

"Overshadowing perhaps, the natural wonders of the state of Oregon," Mr. Price said, in commenting upon his trip, "was the wonderful community spirit that was apparent in practically every city I stopped. Particularly noticeable was this in Corvallis, a city not much if any larger than ours, where two civic clubs and a Chamber of Commerce, are having weekly meetings with an attendance record many times over one hundred at meetings. The enthusiasm and the competition that is aroused at these meetings has been reflected in the every day life of the community to the point that petty jealousies have been forgotten, and every where is a universal spirit that is daily spelling accomplishment."

"I was particularly impressed," Mr. Price continued, "with the interest that is being shown in golf courses. Every city had one, and every city had a bunch of loyal boosters for this form of recreation. In not one place did I find where they measured their golf course in terms of dollars and cents. The main thought was in providing amusement for the home folks, and having an additional attraction for the tourists, and by the way, every city is beginning to fully realize the value of the tourist, and are making extensive plans to capitalize on this industry. This was especially true of those cities on the Roosevelt Highway."

"How does Ashland compare with other cities you visited," Mr. Price was asked. "Very favorably," was his reply. "Very favorable indeed, and that is about the main thing, we have too many here who give themselves to become engulged in personalities, there is not as much interest shown in the Chamber of Commerce, the Kiwanis club, and other similar organizations, as

### Local Banker is Chief Speaker at Assessors Meet

MEDFORD, Nov. 10.—As the main speaker in the afternoon session of the state association of Assessors, J. W. McCoy, Cashier of the First National Bank, St. Ashland, yesterday, told the members of some of the general taxation deficiencies and in a general way suggested some remedies that might be put into effect.

The desecropies now exist, as to the valuations and the resulting high rates as are applied particularly to banks was especially stressed by the speaker, who declared that the fairest basis for remedy some of the glaring defects of the present system, was by the adoption of an income tax of some kind. He presented a number of schedules and examples that tended to prove that the present system was an antiquated one, unfair, and had practically broken down; under the numerous injustices that it was responsible for.

After finishing his talk, nearly two hours was given over to a complete discussion of the problem, with the assessors manifesting unusual interest in the suggestions advanced by the Ashland banker.

### Pastor Deprives Family of Income

PORT WORTH, Texas, Nov. 10 (United News)—When the Rev. J. Frank Norris shot and killed D. E. Chipps in the study of the First Baptist church here last July he deprived the Chipps family of an income of \$1,000 a month.

This was brought out today in a suit for \$150,000 damages filed against the "two-gun" preacher by Daughy Elliot Chipps, 15 year old son of the slain man.

The suit, filed through the other immediate surviving relatives, Mrs. D. E. Chipps, asked \$100,000 actual and \$50,000 exemplary damages. Dr. Norris shot Chipps with malice, the petition stated, adding that the lumberman was earning \$1,000 monthly and had an expectancy of twenty five years.

Dr. Norris went on trial for the murder here last week, but asked for and obtained a change of venue. He will be tried in January in Austin.
