NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—(United News)—Now that James Keetigan's tune's favors are returned to the Hackett is sea enough of immortal stardom to dandle the lives of a herd of ordinary mortals when they are re-distributed. His profile would create a following for some aspiring actor. His front face would earn another's living—the charm and resonance of his voice another's. Many a stockholder could use his business acumen and his antecedents could be doled without hurt among a score of social climbers. As for his luck—any of us could use it. Hackett was not only left a million dollars at a time when he didn't need it, but it was left to him by a woman who never saw him and explicitly hoped that he would never get a penny of it.

It was perfectly within the picture that when this actor died he died suddenly, ripe in years, but far from the ravages of senility—and that his death broke an appointment with royalty. It was no petty royalty either. King George and Queen Mary of England were waiting for the machine that never materialized. Hackett's luck—or whatever it might be called—started early. He was the son of James H. Hackett, the original portrayer of R. D. Van Winkle. His grandfather the Rev. Abraham Keetigan of early Dutch stock, a soldier in the revolution and chaplain of the continental congress of 1776. James was born at Wolf Island, Ontario, on September 6, 1865, but his parents were merely there for the healthful atmosphere, and soon brought the handsome youngster back to New York. For 12 pictures are to be believed, Hackett was good looking from the cradle. The year 1891 finds Hackett graduating after the usual city grammar school preparation, from the College of the City of New York. With his bachelor's degree safe he began the study of law next year, but found it tiresome.
