

### Children Are Busy On Essay Contest

Now that the school children of Jackson County are busy on the essay contest, "Why we should buy Christmas Seals," they find their teachers and parents rather vague as to the many ways these penny seals may serve humanity, so they guess that the money goes for a Red Cross nurse or a hospital.

After the World War the experienced heads of the Red Cross and Anti-Tuberculosis Association decided that they could do better part-time work as separate organizations and arranged that the former secure its money by means of a national membership drive beginning on Armistice Day, and the latter sell holiday stickers marked by the double barred cross. These seals serve a dual purpose as they not only give your holiday mail a bright Yuletide appearance, but they provide funds to carry on the campaign against tuberculosis and other ailments of prevention and education.

The proceeds of the Christmas Seals are used in their own community. Among the many things that Christmas seals do for Jackson County are:

They furnish money to fight tuberculosis. They helped the healthy, sick and crippled to secure expert attention in 40 free clinics in this county since the first of January. They guard the healthy from the great white plague. They help the two county nurses, two school nurses, and county health officer teach health to thousands of children and give continuous supervision to those who are predisposed to the disease.

They help provide headquarters where anyone may be examined free of charge with X-ray pictures. They provide sick-room supplies including complete layettes for infants.

They provided \$360 worth of milk last year to tubercular patients in their homes and pay for diphtheria, scarlet fever and small-pox serums and vaccines for those who cannot afford to pay for it themselves.

They keep facts regarding tuberculosis, gonorrhea and epidemics and their prevention constantly before the community.

They throw wide the door to happiness and security.

This entire campaign against tuberculosis and for funds, then, is an educational move and the wider the move the better the results. This is why our local school authorities with their broad vision of health and social service education allow this one phrase of the campaign to enter the schools and become a health lesson. The essay contest is part of the educational work of the Jackson County Public Health Association, of which Miss Mildred Carlton is president. The pupils of the 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, grades in 76 schools of Jackson County are entering the contest, which offers ten dollars for the first prize and five dollars for the second. The judges are: Mrs. R. W. Ruhl of the Medford Mail Tribune, Mrs. Lee Tuttle of the Daily News, and Mr. C. J. Read of the Ashland Daily Tidings, and the main point they will consider is clear thinking.
