the great white plague. They help the two county hurses, two school nurses, and county health officer teach health to thousands of children and give continuous supervision to those who are predisposed to the dis-


They help provide headquartesr where anyone may be examined free of charge with -ray pictures. They provide sickroom supplies including complete layettes for
