Italy Moves To Calm The French

PARIS Nov. 10 - Italy has moved to avoid a Franco-Italian diplomatic conflict and to calm French public opinion, which has been inflamed by the intrigues of Colonel Risciotti Garibaldi, alleged spy of the Italian police.

Ambassador Avezzana, acting under orders of Mussolini's foreign ministry, was granted a half hour interview with Foreign Minister Briand Monday after France had protested the attacks on French consulate in Vingtmithe, Italy, and in Tripoli and had indicated a further protest over the revelations of Garibaldi.

Avezana expressed Italy's desire for an amicable settlement of outstanding Franco-Italian misunderstandings and is believed to have requested that the Garibaldi investigation in which Italy allegedly appears responsible for intrigues calculated to disturb the relations of France and Spain, be closed frequently.

The French police have stated that Colonel Garibaldi, posing as an anti-fascist in France, accepted money from the Italian fascist police worked with two emissaries of the Rome police department and apparently plotted to send anti-fascists to their arrest or worse in Italy. Questioning of Garibaldi was suspended Monday after several successive days of grilling.

It now remains for the police to clear up misunderstandings regarding the connection of Garibaldi with the plot of Colonel Micia, alleged Catalan separatist, for a revolutionary movement in Catalonia was to be made independent of Spain. Reports that Garibaldi acted as the agent of Rome in assisting Colonel Micia, thus putting France in the position of permitting intrigue within her borders against her military ally, Spain, have been current since the investigation has been completed. Colonel Micia will be brought to Paris to face Garibaldi and the police believe their case against the exiled Italian leader will be complete.
