One hundred O. A. C. students will be placed on probation as a result of low standings in mid-term examinations, E. B. Lemon, registrar, has announced. This number brings the total probation list to 169 students who if failing to better their scholarship will be dropped from College. Of the 890 students reported to the scholarship committee for doing satisfactory work, 638 are deficient in one subject, 186 in two subjects, and 64 in more than two.

Students Represent Foreign Countries

One hundred and twenty-seven students, representing 32 foreign countries, are attending the University of Oregon. Canada leads the foreign countries with 34. Twenty five come from the Philippines, 10 from Russia, nine from England, four from Australia, and several from Finland, Germany, Norway, Bulgaria and Rumania. Siberia, South Africa, Brazil, Austria, Siam, Czechoslovakia, Turkey and Chile are among those which have only one student in attendance.

The board of education of the Eugene school district, after a special meeting last Thursday, announced determination to stamp out vandalism among students of Eugene high school, which came to a head in an open rebellion of some 500 students Wednesday, when J. G. Swan, principal, announced the ineligibility of one of the football players to participate in the Salem game on Armistice day. Depredations in the high school building have been going on for some time, it was learned. A renewal of the night raids occurred Wednesday night, when the outside walls and doors of the building were smeared with black paint.

EXPECT CREDIT ON THIS YEARS INCOME

Secretary Mellon Says Surplus Will Allow Large Reduction

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(United News)—Secretary of the treasury Mellon announced Monday that the surplus this year probably would be large enough to allow a 15 per cent credit on income taxes next year, instead of 12 1-2 as announced several days ago.

He estimated that the surplus for tax reduction likely would reach \$300,000,000 instead of \$250,000,000.

In the face of criticism from members of congress, the secretary insists that the flat credit on taxes is the best form of reduction instead of attempting to map out a general program. Both democrats and republicans had attacked the credit plan as affording little relief to the small taxpayers. To this Mellon answers that it is not a question of giving anybody anything, but of applying a rate that will absorb the surplus available and thus spread the cut all along the line. The reduction he said, will be quite material to some corporations.
