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### General Wood is Defied By Board

MANILA, Nov. 18.—(United News)—In a terse, blunt letter, Manuel Queson and Manuel Roxas have defied Governor General Leonard Wood and declared they will not obey his recent order abolishing the Philippine board of control of which all three were members. They informed Wood that they would continue to per-

form their duties under the insular law creating the board, a law which the attorney general in Washington declared invalid. This law gave the board control over the public utilities which the government conducts. "In order to make our position clear in this matter we beg to invite your attention to this fact, that the laws creating the board of control and confirming its existence have neither been repealed by the Philippine legislator, annulled by congress nor declared unconstitutional and void by a court of competent jurisdiction," the letter read.

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
