Paris Police Move To Curtail Speeding As Accident List Has Mounted Rapidly

PARIS, (UP)—Paris boulevards are doomed to become race tracks when the new police regulations governing motor traffic go into effect.

After the armistice, the war spirit seemed to possess most of the taxi drivers here and as a result, accidents due to over-speeding began to increase at an alarming rate.

In an effort to make the streets of Paris safer for pedestrians, the Prefect of Police resorted to stop watches similar to those in use in America, to time over-hurried automobilists. So many summons were issued following the Prefect's decision that soon the Avenue des Champs-Elysees and the Grand Boulevard looked like a Long Island highway on a Sunday with speedsters tipping one another off to the effect that they were being timed.

While from the Police point of view the method was a complete success, the victims, with the traditional French attitude in matters pertaining to time and speed, decided that as hot two clocks in Paris ever told the same time, so no two watches—even though official police watches—could ever determine with a fair degree of accuracy, whether or not a summons was warranted.

When more protests reached Police Headquarters than could be

handled, the Prefect came to the conclusion that it would be as difficult to use watches in enforcing speed prohibition in Paris as it would be to close up Montmartre, so it was decided to leave well enough alone until different restrictive measures could be adopted.

These have just begun to appear in the form of twenty Police Automobiles equipped with the most up-to-date models of speedometers, which will afford plenty of thrills for Parisian amateurs of automobile racing.

These cars will follow and overtake all those who exceed the speed limit in Paris, day or night, and this time, assures the Prefect of Police, those who are summoned will pay their fines, protest or no protest.

COLLEGE GIVES WORKMEN TASTE FOR "PLUS FOUR"

BOURNEMOUTH, (UP)—That a university education spoils a workman by giving him a taste for plus fours and ice cream, was the theory advanced by the redoubtable Jack Jones, M. P., in defeating the proposal that the British Trade Union Congress should take over the support of Easton Lodge as a university for the working class.
