said Moore. "But it will allow some discretion to the judge so that no poor, silly drunkard, or juvenile will go to prison for life through a series of four comparatively minor escapades as is mandatory under the New York law.
"But it will make it hot for the professional gunman, the first time he is apprehended in New Jersey."
The other bill would change the law relative to concealed weapons to cover any weapons, concealed or not, and raise the penalty to the point of intimidation.
"I am moving with the best advice I can get and in full accord with the opinions of New Jersey jurists."
