their wives the hotel rooms and send the bachelor veterans to the barracks of the French army which would give them another taste of army life.  
 Paris has never been called upon to take care of a single body of visitors of such proportions as this. More than a million tourists come to Paris during the year, but their arrivals are scattered over twelve months. The prospect of thirty thousand and graduated doughboys descending upon the restaurants, the theatres, the museums of Paris and assaulting the hill of Montmartre is not a happy one for the veterans who are now living in France. Much hard work remains to be done in the next

ten months, preparing for the reception and the housing of these visitors, but as one of the veterans puts it:  
 "They've been to France before and they haven't forgotten the little bit of French they learned ten years ago. Just turn them loose and they'll find their way around and none will be carried A. W. O. L. when the home-bound transport steam out after the convention."

## Kill Many Rabbits

**CEDARVILLE, Cal., Nov. 22.**—Indian tribes of Modoc county have been engaging in large drives against rabbits. In one 10-day period nearly 10,000 of the animals were killed.
