Averill, state game warden, is preparing to send to all sportsmen's organizations in the state. Classification of bear as a game animal and of steelhead as a game fish, a five-year closed season on fur-bearing animals, a ten-year closed season on beaver, cutting the deer bag limit to one buck with horns and the trout limit to 25 fish or ten pounds a day are among the changes.

NEW LABOR WAR

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—(United News)—Labor war in Chicago has broken out anew, the police believe, with two murders in three days.

Six persons were under arrest Friday night in connection with the slaying of George Martini, labor organizer and alleged bomber, whose bullet-riddled body was found late Thursday in an automobile which had been deserted in an alley. In the same neighborhood three days ago, Edward Dunn, vice president of a negro flat janitor's union, was murdered. His alleged slayers were captured.

Martini figured prominently in the bomb clean up campaign of states attorney Crowe and Lieut. Charles Egan a year ago. He was named in several indictments, but never apprehended.

Others charged in the bill were caught, however, and several convicted.

Blair, superintendent of the United States Indian School here.

WHO WANTS TO ADOPT BABY BOY?

Who wants a little bright-eyed baby boy?

The little tot was born Saturday at Community hospital, but the mother is unable to care for him, and a good home is being sought for him.

The little fellow is in perfect physical condition, according to Dr. Charles A. Haines, who is seeking a home for the tot. Persons who might be interested in adopting the baby are asked to get in touch with Dr. Haines.

It has long been contended that the Indian could not be a good farmer. This theory has been effectively disproved by the successful results obtained by students here who have operated farm projects for three years.

The first year that the scheme was tried out, only four farm projects averaging 70 acres each, were operated by the Indian boys.

The boys lease farms on the share plan whereby each young farmer receives one-fourth of the crop he raises. Horses, machinery and seed are furnished by the school. The boys do all their own work in addition to taking care of their academic studies in school. Half of each day is spent on the farm and the other half in the school room. The work is conducted under the direction of practical farmers but the boys are encouraged to make all decisions

for themselves. "Not all Oklahoma Indians are in the favored class that enjoy expensive motor cars and other luxuries afforded by leases on rich oil and mining property," says Mr. Blair. "A majority of the youths who attend school here are from the poorer tribes, and most of the boy farmers are dependent upon their own resources for expense money. "Nearly all of the students, however, have allotments of farm land. They are being taught farm management so they may know what to do with their own land after they leave school, and that they may act as economic missionaries to their people."

CHANGE INGREDIENTS VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 22.—(U. N.)—Ingredients used in the making of caviar, famous Russian dish, are being changed. The Oriental market formerly asked only for sturgeon roe in placing purchases for caviar ingredients, but now the demand

for dog salmon, coho and sockeye roe is greater than that for sturgeon roe. At one time bare fish, without heads or fins, was all that was shipped and sent abroad, but now all parts of the fish are prepared for shipment and sent to the Orient for various purposes.
