FARM LEADERS WILL CONFER WITH McNARY

Oregon Senator is Preparing New Farm Relief Bill

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—(U. N.)—Several farm leaders will be in Washington to confer with Senator McNary on the new farm relief bill he is preparing. The draft is not greatly different from the McNary-Haugen bill of the last session, but the machinery is simplified.

The equalization feature remains the central feature of the plan.

Farm leaders will be consulted for any views they may have for incorporation in the bill before its introduction.

Different ideas are heard as to whether the new McNary measure will gather sufficient strength to pass the senate. The result apparently depends upon the recruits gained in the south, where the cotton and rice growers generally have rallied to the support of such legislation, where before they were indifferent.

The bill, as framed, will apply to cotton, corn, wheat, rice and hogs.

SCHEDULE IS GIVEN FOR EARLY MAILING

Postmaster Suggests That Christmas Cards be Mailed Early

The approach of the Christmas season calls attention to the growing custom of sending Holiday greetings among friends and acquaintances and by business houses to their patrons by means of Christmas cards. Information coming to the postoffice department is that the volume of this nature of mail for local delivery will more than double during the coming season over that of a year ago which showed a large increase over preceding years.

Practically all these cards come under the classification of first class mail and call for handling as letter mail. However it is suggested that those contemplating sending considerable numbers of such cards cooperate with the postoffice service to the end that the effect of such greetings be not jeopardized by the possibility of delayed delivery and that they be bought early, and mailed early, like the Christmas parcels.

The following schedule is suggested: When mailed to addresses within one day's travel, Dec. 20th; within two days' travel not later than Dec. 18th; within three days' travel not later than Dec. 16 for more distant points, not later than Dec. 14. Parcels and cards for local delivery should be mailed when possible not later than Dec. 22. Parcels and envelopes may be endorsed "Please do not open until Christmas."

Underestimated Number of Dead and Injured Left in Wake

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 25.—(U. N.)—Sweeping everything before it a tornado twisted through three counties in north Arkansas late today, leveling en-

tire communities and leaving an undetermined number of dead and injured in its wake.

At least ten persons perished in Herber Springs in Cleburne county where the twister struck first, according to first reports which received from Little Rock. This could not be confirmed, communication with the stricken area being impossible.
