Synopsis of the Play, "In the Shadow of the Cross" - The first scene presents Mary Magdalene in her robe of scarlet, charmer of Barabbas whom she denies, in order that she may have the wealth and jewels that the great men of the times are willing to shower upon her. But one glance from the Master breaks her proud heart, so that later she sells everything, jewels, lands, and in a robe of white, carrying only a box of precious ointment, sets her feet in the path of the Nazarene.

The second scene depicts the home of Martha and finds Mary throwing her all at the feet of the Saviour, and shows the healing of Zacharias of his blindness.

In the third scene the return from bloodstained Calvary is portrayed and this is a great dramatic scene.

The fourth scene is at night before the Tomb of the Master and vividly portrays the resurrection and conversion of Barabbas.

In the first scene, the beautiful costumes worn at the feast are very striking and colorful, and Mary Magdalene is characterized in crimson, with beautiful and costly jewels.

The play, "In the Shadow of the Cross," given by the Wright California Players is worthy of the undivided attention of the audience, for it is a drama of people close to Jesus in the days before the Gethsemane, presented in a most artistic and appealing manner. The Christ is not portrayed, it is a story of the lives He touched.
