### Expect To Find X-ray Cancer Cure

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 1. (U.N.)—Cancer, commonly regarded as the incurable scourge of the human race, may soon be placed in the category of curable disease through further development of X-ray treatments, according to radiologists attending the convention here of the Radiological Society of North America. Even now the specialists are agreed that the disease is curable if caught in its incipient stages. "One hundred thousand persons die of cancer every year in the United States," said Dr. J. M. Martin of Dallas, Texas, member of Baylor college's medical staff, "but probably three fourths of these might be cured if the cancer were recognized and treated early enough."

Dr. Martin disputed early theories about the disease by declaring that cancer was not hereditary and did not have roots. "Most cases of cancer originate after one passes forty years of age," he said. "Their origin is some chronic injury to the tissue such as a wart or a pimple which has been subjected to friction from clothing."

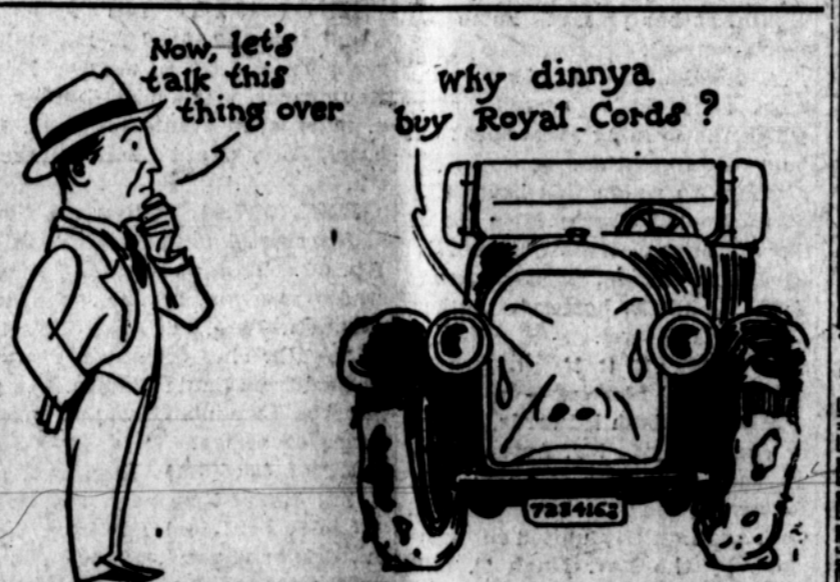
