STATE COMMISSION ADOPTS NEW BUDGET

government \$20,000.
Salmon River highway, Lincoln county, grading, six miles, government \$100,000.
Wapinitz Spur, Mount Hood loop, surfacing 7.6 miles and grading seven miles, government \$60,000, state \$105,000 total \$165,000.
Flora - Enterprise highway, Wallowa county, surfacing 10 miles, government \$48,000, state \$12,000, total \$60,000.

Of these projects the continuing ones are Canyon City-Burns, Wapinitz, Eugene, Florence and Salmon River.
The estimated cost to complete the Rain Rock section of the Eugene-Florence highway is \$900,000 per mile for grading alone. In view of this extreme cost an investigation to determine if a more economical location cannot be made along the main branch of the Sulzlaw by way of Mapleton.

At its next meeting, December 22, the commission will receive bids for the grading of the last section of the Redwood highway in Josephine county. This section involves 10 miles between Hayes and Applegate river.

taining a balance that will pay its own way. It is to correct this condition, and to assist materially in defraying a portion of the great expense a bank must undergo to give the commercial checking account the service necessary to properly care for it, that this step is being taken.

"Other cities throughout the United States have generally adopted this plan, so that locally we are not advancing anything that has not been tried and proved successful," Mr. McCoy further stated.
