NATIONAL PARK DIRECTOR ISSUES ANNUAL REPORT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(UP)—The advent of the flivver is reflected in the National Park director's annual report to the Secretary of Interior, filed today.

More than 3,314,000 persons motored through the vast playgrounds set aside as National Parks in 1925. This is a gain of 269,000 over 1924.

Within ten years since the flivver became an intimate part of American life, visitors to National Parks have increased by 182,000 annually.

Three new parks were created during the past year, the report reveals. They are the Shenandoah in Virginia, Great Smoky

Mount in Tennessee and North Carolina and Mammoth Cave in Kentucky.

Congress, also, has authorized expenditure of \$7,500,000 for improvement of roads and trails throughout the national park system.
