STATE GAME WARDEN MAKES BRIEF VISIT

Is Enthusiastic Over Progress Wild Turkeys Are Making Here

State Game Warden E. F. Averill, who is on an inspection trip through Southern Oregon, was in Ashland today conferring with Senator Dunn and Representative Briggs, and visiting generally with sportsmen. The State official addressed the Isaac Walton League at Grants Pass Tuesday evening, an inspected the Savage Rapid Dam, the following day.

The balance of his time has been spent inspecting the wild turkeys that the state department is propagating in Jackson and Josephine county and today he declared that soon, hunters would be enjoying the same sport that eastern and southern sportsmen enjoy in their annual wild turkey hunts. "We are concentrating our efforts for wild turkey raising in these counties," the game warden stated today, "because we have found that the general conditions here are very similar to that found in the south and east where the turkeys are doing their best. The results here are very gratifying, the birds are doing well and it is my belief that before long it will be possible to enjoy the privileges of hunting these birds."

The general program of work in the fish and game department is progressing very favorably, the state official further stated while here. "We are gradually reaching our objective in that the sports-

men are realizing that the deputy wardens are primarily their best friend, and that their effort is devoted to cooperating with the sportsmen, rather than opposing him, to the ultimate end that every one will receive the greatest benefit from our natural heritage."

Change in Loan Board Is Opposed

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—(UN)—

Protesting against the proposed change in the status of the Federal farm loan board from that of an independent body to a bureau under the treasury department, the National Association of Federal Farm Loan Borrowers, representing the farmer-borrower-stockholder, has been organized here with Carl E. Vrooman, former assistant secretary of agriculture, as president.

The association, whose purpose is to "safeguard, protect and extend the federal rural credit system," hopes to aid in improving and extending the system established ten years ago and in combatting the organized propaganda attacks that have been leveled against it ever since. The sessions were attended by borrowers of the federal rural credit system, members of the American Farm Bureau federation, the range, the farmers' union and officers of important cooperative organizations.

Nearly every section of the county was represented at the meetings which developed an almost unanimous opinion that the time had arrived when the growing assaults on the Federal farm loan system should be checked.
