#### Muma's Predicament

The law sometimes is a wondrous and dreadful "Jap" Muma, newspaper man, involved with Tex Rickard and others in the illegal transportation of moving pictures of the Dempsey-Carpentier fight, faces jail for life because fo his inability to pay a federal court fine. Muma and his codefendants were found guilty and each assessed a fine. Appeal was taken to a higher court but the newspaper man lost his case and he was thrown back on the mercy of the trial court.

The interesting part of the case is in the fact that the judge in imposing the fines gave no alternate jail sentence and did not order confinement of the defendants "until" the fines are settled; there-fore, when Muma appealed, the higher tribunal did not pass on these points but threw his case out on the ground that he did not make application for a writ of mandamus to compel the granting of a writ of habeas corpus within the required three months. On these technicalities it now seems that Muma may have to spend the rest of his life in jail. The writ of habeas corpus was his last hope and it has been denied him because he did not apply within the statutory time.

Muma is a poor man, working for a small salary which will stop when he enters the federal prison. He has not been accustomed to hard labor and probably could not earn much while behind the bars. He has no money and could not hope to earn much while in jail. So, how can be ever hope to pay the fine, which is \$7,000?

#### Christmas Mail Delivery

Uncle Sam's mail carriers must work on Christmas day. The postmaster general decided that it would not be practical to have no deliveries for two days, Saturday and Sunday, so he has ordered a morning delivery on Christmas.

The public should remember that a morning delivery on Christmas will run well into the afternoon because of the heaviness of the mail. If the public would like to help the mail carrier have a little time at home on Christmas, it can mail its packages early. Not the day before Christmas, but several days before, in time to have them delivered before December 25. If this is done, the mail will be no heavier than normal on that morning. The carrier can get through by noon and have the after-

noon with his family. Will the public help!
