The audience was stirred by a thrill almost forgotten while they watched the president dramatically appear before congress and deliver the message that precipitated the declaration of war. There were mobilization scenes, peace and the departure for France of a vigorous Wilson.

Many in the town hall audience knew Wilson personally and they passed from applause to tears when the last of the six reels depicted the broken man appearing feebly in the last stages of his fatal illness. The rights to the film have been obtained by the Woodrow Wilson foundation of which Norman Davis is chairman.

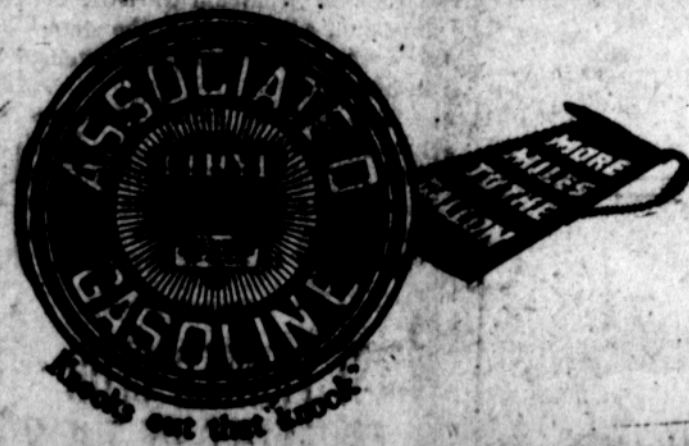
