DESERT PACK MULES FOR THE AEROPLANE

Hardy Prospectors Taken to Gold Rush Scenery by Air

HASBROUCK HEIGHTS, N. J., Dec. 17.—(UN)—Equipment for transporting hardy prospectors to the blizzard swept gold rush scenes in Manitoba left here Thursday—a luxurious Fokker cabin monoplane.

The big ship took the air on a hasty call from a group of the modern "49'ers" on the first leg of one of the longest winter trips ever made by a commercial plane and headed toward Winnipeg.

It was a far cry from the pack mules of California and the dog teams and creaking sleighs of Alaska.

Captain Oks, a former member of the Royal Canadian air force, sat at the controls. The miners will ride with him in a heated cabin, designed to let them laugh at temperatures 20 to 30 degrees below zero. At the first stop a nice foot pair of skis will replace the wheel landing gear, to allow taking off over the snow. The Fokker was due at Buffalo or Camp Burden, Toronto, late Thursday.
