### Democracy's Foundations

As an attraction of public interest and as an occupant of the first page newspaper space, there is no denying that the Halls-Mills murder trial made of the Fall-Doheny case an ignominious alsoran. Comparison of the two makes a fairly good philosophic ground upon which to base some honest thoughts about democracy and its much-touted and brawl-engendering holiness.

What are the facts! A member of the cabinet, a sanctified guardian of the democratic holy of holies of our national government, (for which, we ecstaticize each Fourth of July, our forefathers ran blood) is charged with having sold out 100 million dollars' worth of public lands for 100 thousand dollars, or just one-tenth of one per cent on the dollar — and with having pocketed the whole 100 thousand, leaving the public what the little boy is reported to have shot at.

The case comes up for trial after a most leisurely four years, just contemporaneously, so it hap-pens, with evidence that many millions have been spent in a half dozen states to secure election to the United States senate. There is the story of the million spent to elect a United States senator from Pennsylvania, and the alleged brazen election board frauds that followed in the wake of the spending, ecting William S. Vare.

There is the story of the public utility slush fund in Illinois, and the election of Frank Smith, member of the Illinois public utility commission, as United States senator there. There are the rumblings of the more recent shush funds in the senatorial elections in Maine and in Massachusetts, of which nothing has been proven, it is true, but the Maine charges were supported by the authority of the governor of the state, himself a republican, as is Senator-elect Gould, in whose behalf the money was spent.

All these instances, from Fall and Doheny down to Senator-elect Gould," are serious charges affecting the very foundations of democracy. They are more potent attacks against the theory of popular rule than were the Stamp Tax and its legislative relations which provoked Lexington and Concord and what followed them, up to the founding of the new United States, the first democracy since Greece and Rome dedicated to the theory that all men are equal, money or no money.

They should be tinder enought in this to start a holocaust of flaming indignation - if democracy were loved and patriotism as holy as all this flagshouting and fervent per-orationing would indicate they are. Any one of these offenses against democracy would have been enough to start a real war back in 1776, enough to let the dogs of battle-slip and tear through the entire country.

But they start no holocaust now. The dogs of war are gnawing too comfortably upon the fat bones of contentment, perhaps, to be worried about who goes to the United States senate, or how or what happens to the public oil field reserves of the people of the United States.

Or is it contentment? Is it the callousness the sang froid of full dinner pails and bungalow garages and radios, or is it a sophistication born of a hundred and fifty years' experience with democracy!

You pay your money, as the saying goes, and you take your choice. You stand for the assessor and the income tax collector and write your checks for them, you shout democracy and snarl at Queen Maries when they bring close to hand the aura of so-called royalty on occasion, but you read the Halls-Mills case and lose your sleep over it rather than bought elections-if you lose any sleep at all. Purchased elections and stolen public property are politics and politics you say, is bunk, even though it is the nursing pap of democracy. Why worry about bunk when there are such interesting things as smoking pistolry and sex triangles, ultra-romantic and ultra-revengeful women, and Willie Stevenses; thick-lipped, to weave into real drama? It is on such a very human nature that democracy has to maintain her foundations.


