COMMERCE APPOINTEE DEVELOPS NEW ISSUE

Appointment of Pennsylvania Man Said to be Political

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(UN)—Whether bodies like the Interstate commerce commission are to continue to be quasi-judicial, or are to become political is the issue at the bottom of the new fight brewing in the senate over the nomination of Cyrus E. Woods of Pennsylvania.

Woods was appointed to the Interstate commerce commission because of threats made last winter by Senator David T. Reed of Pennsylvania that he would oppose all future nominations to this body until Pennsylvania was represented on it.
