Repair Men Know Value of Tires

"If you really want to know tires, talk to the men who repair them." That is the advice of Mr. H. L. Claycomb of the Claycomb Motor Company.

"They can quickly tell you what kind of tires are in the shop most often for repairs, as well as those they see the least. Just ask them to point out the weak spots that cause tires to fail.

"You can puncture any tire, for there are many sharp objects much harder than rubber, which can be forced through it. But some tires puncture much easier than others because of poor construction. This often leads to quick and costly failure of the tire. Moisture penetrates the hole, rots and plies and the tire soon gives way.

"Rim cuts, rut wear, bruises, ply separation and bead failure are other troubles that bring tires to the repair shop. Then we get a chance to see what they are made of and why they 'go bad'."
