MUNICH, Germany. (UP)—Word has reached here of a miniature peasant uprising against bobbed hair. Two young Viennese women, accompanied by their husbands, arrived in the alpine village of Lungau and, tired after a long tramp, removed their hats. Shocked villagers observed that their heads were bobbed.

Turning in an emergency fire alarm, one of the local citizens hastily summoned the village greybeards to a conference. The meeting promptly decided that the two Viennese alpinists must be deported from Lungau. Despite rain and chill darkness, the bobbed-haired women were routed out of the inn at night and forced to leave the precincts by a crowd of indignant villagers.

The innkeeper who had given shelter to these "disreputable" guests was warned never to disgrace the village again by harboring bobbed-haired strangers under his roof.

TREES CURE DISEASE IN PALESTINE COLONIES
NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—(United Press)—Newly planted trees saved the Holy Land this year over \$1,000,000 in doctor bills, according to reports received here by the Zionist Organization.

These reports indicate an enormous drop in malaria in the sections of Palestine, where afforestation work has been pursued. One of the Jewish colonies, Chedara, formerly a "malaria hole" which some years ago, was on the verge of being abandoned on account of the heavy malaria mortality, is now a thriving, populous settlement as the result of the planting of large numbers of eucalyptus trees, which by their large absorption of moisture, have dried up the marshes, where the mosquitoes carries of the malaria infection breed.

McNabb Named Police Head

The entire nine weeks since election as a result of which the appointments have been made after impartially weighing the merits and demerits of each.

The only two of the appointments which were much in contention are Chief of Police and City Electrician.

Regarding Chief McNabb who has a splendid service record of nearly four years at Ashland, and who has kept this city and the surrounding mountain region very

free of crime and the harboring of criminals in cooperation with the state and county officers, who is in high favor with all our educational and civic organizations because of his watchful care over and splendid results with our boys and girls, whose office record is excellent, and whose personal courage and honesty have never been in question so far as we know, against all of these good qualities we admit are ranged some minor objections largely concerning the chief's personal bearing toward alleged offenders which feature we believe is softening and with greater contact and experience.

Mr. McNabb also stands high with retiring mayor and council. Believing as we do that Chief McNabb's general record easily outweighs the few objections against him, and that men of his personal character and ability who truly love such trying dangerous occupation are everywhere scarce, we can only see one logical thing to do for the general good, viz. to reappoint Mr. McNabb chief of police.

Regarding the appointment of Mr. Malone there has been considerable opposition, largely because he bore most of the brunt of the failure of the city manager plan during the first half of 1926, which failure we believe occurred from lack of preparation, especially from lack of city charter revision, and the responsibility for which as maintained for six months was more or less divided. No real harm was done by the experiment and not likely to be repeated in the light of past experience.

In Mr. Malone's favor it must be admitted that since he was relieved of his former great authority he has never sulked or declined any assignment by mayor and council and has done a lot of useful work the last six months of the year. He has shown special aptitude in gathering data and working up reports, is at present in good standing with retiring mayor and council and with consulting engineers, Henry and Dillard. Mr. Malone holds a state license without which under our Oregon laws no one can qualify as city electrician of our class. Mr. Malone fully understands that he is now appointed to only one department, that of city electrician, to which he pledges his loyalty and entire time.

The mayor and council take this means of informing the public that all council committee appointments have been made with reference to special fitness and congenial occupation for each the council is enthusiastically committed to close cooperation with the various department heads and each committee assumes an added responsibility for its particular department which gives confidence for prompt confirmation of all appointments above, even the debatable ones.

The council has unlimited power to promptly terminate any of the above appointments if same do not prove to be satisfactory.

We are starting one of the greatest years in Ashland's history where to gain the best results in your behalf we urge that all criticism be suspended and that every individual in Ashland lend us his full support in carrying out the large program for which you elected us.
