Lure of Hidden Wealth Proves too Strong for Ancient Miner

DENVER, Jan. 14.—(UN)—Once worth half a million, now with only a grubstake, an old prospector left here today to seek again the pot of gold at the rainbow's end.

Charles Schneider for 40 years a wanderer seeking gold in the Klondike, a man who made his stake and lost it, left on a train for the Red Lake district of Canada, newest of the world's El Dorados. The latter part of this month Schneider will bid civilization goodbye and take to the trail he hopes will lead him to another fortune.

Forty years ago Schneider passed through what is now Denver in a covered wagon. He went on to Alaska, staked out a claim and hit it rich. Schneider then staked his money in other claims and lost. Discouraged, he came back to the states. News of a new El Dorado in the Red Lake district brought back the lure. He is off again to the wilds and says he believes he will "hit it rich."

BELLVIEW TELEPHONE COMPANY HAS MEETING

Company is in Excellent Shape and Has Had Good Year

The Bellview Telephone company held their annual meeting at the Bellview school house, Wednesday evening, January 11. Fourteen members were present.

The report of the secretary shows that there are thirty telephones in active use on their lines. The company owns four distinct lines, there being in use over the whole system in the neighborhood of fifty miles of wire.

These lines are owned cooperatively, each member owning his individual telephone instrument. The cost last year for telephone service over the lines, figures about eight dollars. This includes the cost of keeping the company lines in repair and the switch board privileges paid to the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. Similar service furnished by the Pacific phone costs twenty-eight dollars annually so the company figures that they save annually the neat sum of six hundred dollars to the community in telephone bills.

The treasurer's report shows a balance of \$25 in the general fund and \$77 in their savings account. This savings account is being built up as an emergency fund to take care of unusual emergencies and extensive new construction.

The company voted to rebuild a half mile of old line that had done service for twenty years. The company prides itself on the excellent service that its members receive and they feel that this is due to the fact that they look upon this activity as a business proposition that is worthy of their careful attention.

The committee consists of Senators Norblad, chairman, Butler, Beals, Banks and Garner.

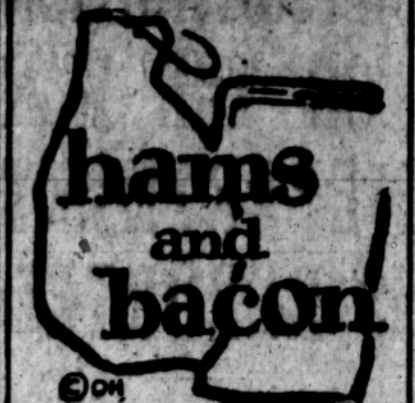
