Dr. Fenton of the American National Red Cross gave a talk on First Aid to the high school assembly, Tuesday morning. Dr. Fenton commended everyone's attention by his rapid-fire, witty talking.

Dr. Fenton is traveling in a private car on the Southern Pacific lines, talking to schools, individuals and employees of the Southern Pacific, giving them, not instructions for Safety First, but for First Aid. He is on the road, speaking for 11 months out of the year, and he talked to over 158,000 people last year.

Dr. Fenton used as his assistant Everett Yeo. He demonstrated on his "patient" methods of quietly reviving someone who has fainted, checking a hemorrhage in different parts of the body, several different uses of the 36 inch three cornered bandage, and the prone method of promoting artificial respiration.

Dr. Fenton said that First Aid must be three things: simple, practical and efficient, and showed in his talk how the Red Cross methods carry out these three essentials.

Kay Nell, president of the student body; Jean Stratton, secretary; Barney Miller, editor of the "Rogue News," and Eleanor Swendenburg are leaving Thursday morning for Eugene, where they will attend the annual Press Convention. This convention is held

by the University of Oregon every year, for the high school students of Oregon.

**AMEE'S NEMESIS TO GIVE SOME LECTURES**

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 14—(UN)—Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman, state witness in the Almee Semple McPherson conspiracy case today signed a contract to go on the lecture platform and tell the "inside" story of the famous trial.

Mrs. Wiseman's tour will take her in some of the cities in which the evangelist will lecture, if the tentative itinerary is followed: The woman who figured in the famous "Miss X" hoax will start her speaking tour in San Francisco, January 20.

Mrs. Wiseman is expected to deny assertions of Asa Keyes, district attorney of Los Angeles county, that she changed her testimony after the preliminary hearing in the case and thus forced the state to drop the charges against the evangelist.

While Mrs. Wiseman was preparing to go before the public with her story, Lester William Roth, attorney for Kenneth G. Ormliston, Mrs. McPherson's former radio operator, said that Ormliston planned to stay in Los Angeles.

Ormliston has declined several vaudeville contracts. He will spend his time writing magazine articles and hopes to get a position running a radio station, his counsel said.

**WILL SPEAK ON THE "INSIDE STORY OF FAMOUS TRIAL"**

NEWPORT, R. I., Jan. 13.—Two rescue ships which went to the rescue of the freighter Pomham, stranded on a ledge in Narragansett bay, were piled on the same rocks Wednesday night as a swarm of small "eagle" boats hauled away to set him free.

The L-49 from the naval torpedo station also went aground, but was subsequently refloated.

None of the 13 men on the Pomham is considered in danger. There is a slight hole in the ship's hull.

The three ships, carrying a total of 18 men went on the rocks in an unsuccessful attempt to free the Pomham. The triple accident occurred during a heavy swell that battered the craft continuously. In rapid succession, the naval tug Triton, the steam lighter L-49 and the range boat 526 grounded on Rose Island ledge. All three are attached to the United States naval torpedo station here. The L-49 was soon freed, however, and stood by. The range boat 526 had succeeded in getting alongside the Pomham and removing Captain Richard Windsor when it suddenly piled on the ledge. Hardly had this occurred when the other two government boats also were grounded.


