critically wounded and the father suffered a slight wound. Marble, who is declared by medical authorities and his neighbors to be sane, laughed at the body of the dead boy. He said he regretted nothing. "They killed my dog," said Marble.

And in court before District Judge Charles Swindall he begged:

"Give me death, that the state may be satisfied, that the community may be gratified and that I may be electrified. "I am blind in one eye and the other is going. If you send me to prison for life in unfamiliar surroundings, unable to see what food and drink I am given, or the hand that strikes me or the steel or stone on which I fall, it will be the cruellest fate I have known a white man to inflict on another."

ASHLAND STANDS FIRST IN MONEY RAISED

Ashland high school's basket-Three hundred and seventy-five dollars is the total amount of money which was raised during the holidays for the benefit of the Fine Arts building. Committees from several towns in the state were appointed shortly before Christmas to arrange benefits, but due to the late date of starting, the schedules in many places were incomplete, and it was impossible to arrange a benefit of any nature.

Ashland turned in the largest amount of money with \$134.50, Baker is second with \$82.00, and Pendleton third with \$40.00. Other towns which raised money for the drive are, St. Helens, \$37.00; Milwaukie, \$5.00; Marshfield, \$23.50; La Grande 10.00; Dallas, \$25.00; and McMinnville, \$18.50.

According to Kathryn Ulrich, chairman of the drive, the amount turned in wasn't quite as much as was expected, but is good considering the late start.

Preparations for the spring drive will begin immediately, and committees will be appointed in the middle of this term. Due to the excellent showing which Ashland made in the drive, Miss Edith Dodge, of this city, has been named as chairman of the spring drive.
