political scandal. Investigation in Pennsylvania and Illinois have revealed startling campaign expenditures running over a million dollars in one case. In Illinois Frank L. Smith, the successful republican candidate, admitted receiving \$125,000 from Samuel Insull, utility magnate. The gift was regarded by many senators as reprehensible because Smith, at the time he accepted it, was head of the Illinois commerce commission which fixed rates on Insull's utilities. The fight over Smith's moral fitness to sit in the senate probably will begin after New Year.

Another senator, Gould of Maine, is under scrutiny because he gave \$100,000 to a Canadian official some years ago when he was trying to get favors from the provincial government of New Brunswick. This affair is now being investigated by a senate committee, and it may be that a fight will be made to unseat Gould. Vore of Pennsylvania also faces a fight when he comes in a year from now over his expenditures in Pennsylvania.

Much bickering and little business is the story of the year. Whatever the bickering may come to in the end, it has already stimulated the consciences of a good many men in public life.

**POLITICAL PRISONERS ARE NEEDED IN BRAZIL**

**RIO DE JANEIRO (UP)**—Only several months have passed since Dr. Washington Luis took over the presidency of Brazil but more has been accomplished during that period toward political pacification of this country than was done in the entire six years prior to his inauguration, November 15.

Among President Luis' first moves after he took office was the release of a number of political prisoners, among whom were high naval and military officers, newspaper men and prominent civilians. Only a few weeks after the inauguration of the new administration a shipload of political prisoners was brought back to Rio from the prison on the island of Trinidad.

## INTERNATIONAL RED CROSS ENDS STRIFE; TO FORM ORGANIZATION LIKE LEAGUE COUNCIL

GENEVA—Peace has at last been established in the ranks of the International Red Cross society.

The actual signing of the peace treaty, however, will only take place at an international conference to be held in Switzerland next spring and which will be attended by delegates of all the leading governments of the world as well as representatives of all of the national Red Cross societies.

The necessity of healing up certain divergencies that existed in the international organization of the Red Cross has become especially imperative owing to the fact that the International Union for the relief of disaster stricken nations which the League of Nations expects to launch next year will count largely on the Red Cross organization for the carrying out of its mutual assistance in time of need.

The difficulty that has existed in the interior ranks of the Red Cross for a number of years past arose from the fact that it was an organization with two heads which did not work together.

The Red Cross, as originally constituted in 1863 and 1864, established as its central executive head a committee of Geneva citizens known as the International Red Cross committee. They served as a sort of link between the various national Red Cross societies that sprang up in the different countries.

Following the war, however, Americans with vast financial resources behind them conceived the idea of a larger and more effective organization. As a consequence in 1919 the League of National Red Cross societies was launched with a president and executive committee of its own.

For a time this organization made its international headquarters at Geneva and tried to work in harmony with the original International Red Cross committee, but later moved to Paris, from where various efforts were launched to arrive at some basis of union.

The situation was complicated by the fact that the original International Red Cross committee at Geneva wished to restrict the activities of the organization to the original ends for which it was created, namely the lessening of the horrors of war, and help for the wounded, mutilated, fugitives and prisoners. In other words, it was to be strictly a wartime organization.

On the other hand, the league of National Red Cross societies
