Size of Chaplin
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17.
Just how much of the Charlie Chaplin fortune amount to was still a matter of conjecture.
The famous film comedian's general manager prevented opening of the great safe at the Chaplin studio by attorneys representing Chaplin's girl wife, Leta Gray Chaplin, in her suit for divorce.
Reeve was reported to be in the studio in compliance with a court order by which Mrs. Chaplin's counsel hoped to check the vault contents. The film clown's manager was said to be the only person in the city possessing the combination to the strong box.
While Mrs. Chaplin's legal aides were temporarily halted in their quest for an inventory of the Chaplin holdings, variously estimated at from \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000, rumors were current in Hollywood that the search would avail the estranged wife nothing. There were reports that all valuable documents had been removed from the vaults. All papers of importance have been taken from the safe, it was said, and prints of the finished portion of Chaplin's latest picture, "The Circus," valued at approximately \$1,000,000, also were taken away a few days ago, according to a friend at the screen paltoon.
