## A STANDARD FOR THE PEOPLE

A lecture on the subject "A Standard for the People" will be delivered by G. R. Pollock of New York at the Winter Garden Hall Thursday, Jan. 20 at 8 o'clock.

The speaker will point out the need for a common standard, a common rallying center, around which they can gather and work for peace and for all that is desirable in the relationship of man with man.

He asserts that such a standard is not unattainable; that on the contrary it is right within reach and may be readily understood and appreciated by all.

Millions have fought and died around the standards of the past and to little purpose. No great good has resulted from the efforts of the past. In our day we feel that we have reached the best attainable along many lines; and yet we realize, with a sense of horror, that all the good that has been accomplished is threatened with complete annihilation.

Together with plans and schemes for universal peace, there is increased preparation for war on every hand. The implications of destruction and methods of health-dealing warfare have been made so formidable that should another war break out between any of the great powers, it is more than probable that civilization as we have known it would be completely blotted out.

Many of the prominent men of our day recognize this fact; and some in an earnest effort to prevent the catastrophe, raise up what they conceive to be an acceptable standard through which, it is hoped, the people may be safeguarded. The League of Nations standard are prominent among these proposed plans.

The speaker seems to feel, however, that all these endeavors are abortive and inadequate. He asserts that the perfect standard is set before us plainly in the writings of the Bible, and it will be his aim to point out at the Sunday lecture that the perfect standard is the Word of Truth which alone meet the world's needs along national and individual lines.

He will call attention to passages of the Bible which are seldom if ever referred to, but which, he claims, are most significant when the meaning is grasped. It would seem that the lecture, which will last for about an hour, will be well worth listening to.

No collections will be taken at the lecture and all seats are free. Those who have made arrangements for the meeting extend a cordial invitation to all who desire a clearer insight into this scripture as it applies to our day.

## Pythian Lodge to Do Charity Work

The international extension program announced recently by officers of the Supreme Lodge Knights of Pythias, will, in a large measure, direct the activities of Ashland Lodge, according to Chancellor Commander Dunn, who was recently installed with eight other officers of the lodge to direct the work of the Pythian fraternity in this city during the year.

The program, includes among other activities a definite plan to increase the social features, quicken interest in community service and to make a stronger appeal to worthy citizens to become members of the Order.

The lodge has set as a mark in the increase of its membership under the general plan announced by the Supreme Lodge to secure a twenty per cent gain during the year.

Commenting on the outline for the new year, Chancellor Commander Dunn said: "The program is intended to make the lodge a real factor in the life of the community and to aid in the extension of the benefits of fraternal membership by performing its share in the great national movement. The movement is supported by nearly one million members in the United States and Canada. We have over 6,400 lodges and it is the purpose of the program of activity to make every one of these lodges the center of fraternal accomplishment in performing the service for which the fraternity was founded—to make better homes and better communities in which to live.

The Pythian Order now operates 18 homes for aged members, their widows and orphans. Five other states are building homes. Investment in this phase of Pythian endeavor amounts to more than \$4,000,000 and over 2,000 men, women and children are provided with home comforts. Five grand domains have established educational trust funds by which worthy young men and women are given opportunity for advanced college training. Nearly two hundred are now being kept in colleges through loans from these funds.

"The Pythian Sisters, the woman's auxiliary of the Order, has a membership of nearly a half million and distributes annually more than \$250,000 for the care of orphaned children and for the comforts of the aged and poverty stricken.

"The Military Department is very active and is offering to the young membership a military training almost equal to that obtained in barracks maintained by the various states.

"The Insurance Department has celebrated its 49th birthday by moving into its new home office building in Indianapolis, Ind., located on the war memorial plaza. This branch of the Order has distributed over \$60,000.00 to widows and orphans. It has nearly 100,000 members and insurance for home protection amounting to over \$120,000,000.

"In every respect the financial condition of the Order is gratifying. The Subordinate Lodges distributed last year \$1,709,000 for relief. The assets of Grand and Subordinate lodges is over \$30,000,000, a gain of over \$1,015,000 for the year, and in 1926 sixty-six lodges built their own homes cost more than \$8,000,000.
