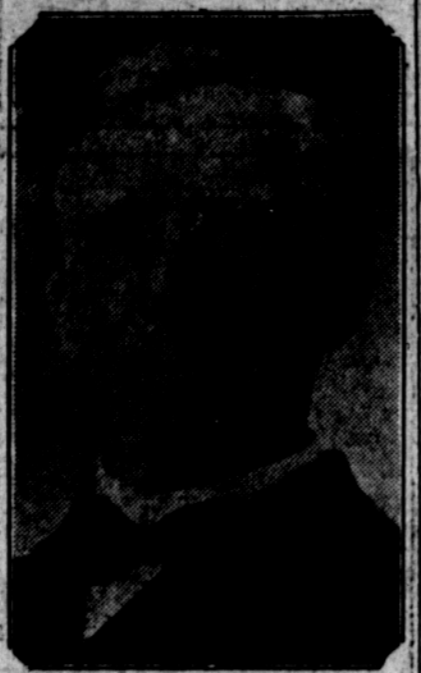

four institutions after it had been determined just how much money

will be available for such purposes.
An estimate of \$13,000 for the pursuit of fugitives from justice was trimmed to \$10,000, while a request for \$244,000 for the care of orphans and foundlings in state aided institutions was reduced to \$200,000. The estimate of \$55,000 for the care of wayward girls was reduced to \$45,000.

dered one of the squad to go up and shoot him to put him out of his misery. I don't suppose I'll look at the matter now as I did then. You see I am 84 years old and my ideas have changed somewhat. I believe now that he should have been put on a boat and shipped back to Austria. But General Juarez ordered him shot and I was in charge of the executions so I had to be a party to it."

Sobieski admitted he was sixth in line from John III of Poland, but smilingly refused to comment on his ancestry. He came to this country at the age of 12, alone and friendless, and joined the United States army as a bugler. He served in the army for ten years, suffering a body wound at the battle of Gettysburg.
The aged adventurer is still active and has a keen mind for his years.
