A testimonial to the fact that a true reporter never gives up hope, prohibition. Trivial inquiries usually are answered quite completely. Controversial ones are dealt with gingerly if at all. For the presidential spokesman knows fully the advantages of innocent publicity as well as the dangers

of becoming involved in political debate.

Though Mr. Coolidge is the first president to write the full benefit that is possible through this White House figure of speech, the institution appears to be one more thing that Woodrow Wilson will have to answer for. He developed the present method of dealing with the press, though not quite to the artificial heights since reached.

Cleveland refused to have anything to do with reporters because the press had taken over some incidents of his earlier private life. McKinley rarely saw reporters. They got their news from Mark Hanna. Roosevelt called in favorites. Taft essted out most of his news through the Washington correspondent of the Taft family newspaper, the Cincinnati Times-Star.

Wilson was the first president to eliminate these journalistic middle-men and open the White House to all correspondents through semi-weekly press conferences. He never permitted

himself to be quoted, although the substance of what he said might be used with its source disguised. Usually it was attributed to a high authority or a friend of the president, or some such vague source. Finally the press gradually came to use the term "White House Spokesman" for this purpose.

During Harding's administration the system of requiring questions began. This was because Harding talked too freely on one occasion when reporters fired a heavy volley of rapid-fire questions at him.
