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STRONG FIGHT MADE TO KEEP PROMINENT MAN FROM GALLOWS

Attorneys, Parents and Wife All Cooperate in Last Minute Effort

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 1.— (UN)—One of the most intensive fights ever made in California to save a condemned man from the gallows is being waged in behalf of Edward K. Sayer, Denver youth, sentenced to die in Folsom prison Friday. Sayer himself, his attorney, parents and wife, together with Denver interests are cooperating in a last minute effort to thwart the punishment which the state supreme court and Governor Young have said must be carried out.

George A. Connelly, Sayer's lawyer, today addressed a letter to Grover Young, urging commutation of the death penalty to life imprisonment. The attorney told the United News that he probably would go to Sacramento Tuesday or Wednesday to plead his case in person before the governor.

From "murderer's row" in Folsom prison, Young Sayer dispatched a telegram to his mother in Sacramento urging her to visit him because of an important development. The wire was sent through the warden's office, and while it was said there the exact nature of Sayer's new plan was unknown, but it was believed that he had uncovered some technicality which he hoped might save him.

There are a number of former lawyers who are confined here and some of them have been talking to Sayer, said Warden Smith's secretary. "Probably some of these men have given Sayer some tip or other that he figures may influence Governor Young."

FASCISTS CHOOSE A DRUG CLERK LEADER

Pompous Display Marks Inducting of Former Clerk Into Office

PRAGUE, Feb. 1.—Cheered by hundreds of wearers of the black shirts, Radola Gajda, one-time drug clerk and soldier of fortune, has been chosen as the new Fascists' IL Duce of Czechoslovakia. Pompous display marked induction into office of the 34-year-old deposed chief of the general staff, who abandoned his mixing bowls in the back room of a drug shop 13 years ago to enjoy greater activity on the firing lines of Central Europe.

With its new leader, Czech Fascism intends to keep free from all political alliances. It hopes that the proud title of IL Duce which it has bestowed upon Gajda may one day come true and that Fascism eventually will rule the country.

Gajda was born in Rudolf Geidl, son of a comparatively well to do family of Moravia. The Geidls were considered as of German descent. Which he joined the Austrian army in 1914, he rose rapidly to the ranks of private, lance corporal and sergeant major. Like so many other Czech patriots, he left the Austrians and went over to the Montenegrin lines.
