### REFUGEES NEED FOOD INSTEAD OF TENTS

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 2.—(UN)—Food instead of tents is the greatest need of refugees from flood waters near Des Arc, Ark., according to word received here this afternoon from County Judge J. W. Craig of Prairie county.

Judge Craig called Brigadier General J. R. Wayne Adjutant of the national guard, who immediately got in touch with Helen Hedrick, executive secretary of the Red Cross in Arkansas. Relief measures will be taken at once, it is thought.

Judge Craig said that so far as he was able to learn there had been no loss of life in the flood which struck Pioneer and other plantations across the White river from Des Arc when the levee broke Sunday afternoon flooding thousands of acres to depth of ten to fifteen feet.
