season he has installed a 6000 egg electric incubator. When he gets well under way he will be hatching from 800 to 1000 chicks per week.

He considers the egg market here as satisfactory and he feels that there are bright prospects in the future for the poultry industry.

When asked if he would advise starting on three acres he replied, "No," because danger from soil contamination. Soil contamination, to his mind, is the hardest problem and the main source of trouble to every grower.

He spends little or more "if a chick is not given new ground each year, there is sure to be trouble and if a fellow can't raise a nice bunch of pullets he is beaten before he gets started," he said.
