

DEMPSEY TO CONTINUE CAMPAIGN FOR CHAMP

Blood Poisoning Will Not Prevent His Attempt to Gain Crown

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 10—(UN)—Jack Dempsey, recovering from a serious attack of blood poisoning, is still determined to carry on his campaign to regain the heavyweight championship of the world, his wife, Estelle Taylor, said today.

"Jack's arm and hand will be as good as ever in a few weeks," the screen actress said, "and except for a short postponement his training plans are the same as before the illness."

Dempsey was entirely out of danger today, and in a much better frame of mind than at any time since he contracted the poisoning, the former champion's wife said.

"The doctor has assured Jack that his arm and hand will heal soundly and that has helped him in his quick recovery, but he probably will be forced to remain in bed at least a week longer."

After all effects of the poisoning have disappeared, Mrs. Dempsey said, Jack will go to the mountains to prepare for his proposed bout with Tunney. He will confine his early training to roadwork and woodchopping and will do no boxing until he is sure his hand can stand the strain.

STRIBLING WINNER IN HIS FIRST BOUT

Defeats Eddie Huffman Before Small Crowd of New Yorkers

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Feb. 10—Young Stribling of Georgia made an impressive New York debut as a heavyweight Monday night when he defeated Eddie Huffman of California in ten rounds before 5,735 fight fans, the smallest crowd of the season, at Madison Square Garden.

HINDU IMPRISONED ON GIRL'S CHARGES

Strange Story of Alleged Abduction Told in Court Room

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10—(UN)—A strange story of mesmerism, involving a 19 year old girl and her alleged abduction by a Hindu metaphysician, was related today when the United States circuit court of appeals confirmed a sentence of five years imprisonment against Colonel Dinesh P. Ghadiali, known as the "Hindu Edison."

Ghadiali was convicted of having taken Geraldine McCann from her home in Portland, Ore., to California and subsequently on a transcontinental journey. Prosecution was under the Man act, and Ghadiali was ordered to pay a \$5,000 fine as well as serve the penitentiary term.

According to evidence introduced at the trial Ghadiali obtained complete control over the girl after she had visited him in the hope that he could cure an ailing aunt.

Finally, because of the Hindu hypnotic wish, Miss McCann signed a document giving herself over completely to Ghadiali, the prosecution charged.

As part of this agreement Miss McCann promised to abstain from the use of meat, tobacco or intoxicants, to dress as Ghadiali ordered and without "beautifying measures," lace silk stockings or high heels.

DEATH STILL MYSTERY

MARSHALLTOWN, Iowa, Feb. 10—(UN)—Extended efforts to solve the death of her sweetheart having been futile, Miss Veda Bellefleur, 19, was permitted to return to high school today.

Miss Bellefleur was the fiancée of Charles C. Elrod, Nebraska war veteran, who was found dead recently in his room in a Marshalltown hotel. To test his love the romantic girl had written flaming love letters to herself signing the names of imaginary rivals and had showed them to Elrod. An examination of the youth's body failed to indicate Elrod had been murdered.

Ohio Man Makes Shoes for Cripples

ELYRIA, O., Feb. 10—(UP)—One of Elyria's most widely known citizens is a maker of odd shaped shoes.

William Rivett, who makes shoes for cripples in his little home on the outskirts of Elyria is known to thousands of unfortunate persons, the country over. He is a specialist, creating shoes for deformed feet. Sometimes he just makes over a standard shoe, but often he builds a new one.

Rivett has devoted many years to the study of shoemaking, and has contributed several inventions of his own to it. He has invented special arch supports and new types of heels to enable his crippled customers to walk.

His reputation is widespread, and he satisfies far-away customers by mail, for all that he needs is a few brief instructions and he builds the shoe.

On the shelf of his workroom is a list of patients in the Gates Memorial hospital for Crippled

Children here. Rivett makes their shoes.

He has fashioned hundreds of pairs of shoes for disabled employees of the United States Steel Corporation and Judge Elbert H. Gary is his personal friend.

There are fewer cripples than there used to be, because accidents in the mills are decreasing, Rivett said.

Unlike the majority of specialists, he is not particularly fond of his work.

"I'd be glad if I never had to make another shoe for a cripple," he said.

Rivett's only assistant is his wife, who is his constant companion in his little workroom. They were married in Manchester, England, 44 years ago.

Installation Plan Marriage Fails

BERKELEY, Cal., Feb. 10—(UN)—The installment plan marriage of Charles Naylor and Priscilla Christie will be followed by a paid in advance annulment.

Charles is 18 years old and Priscilla only 17. They were married in Martinez where Charles, short of cash, gave \$1 to Justice of the Peace Frank H. Glass with the promise that \$4 more would follow soon. The bridegroom explained that the \$2 for a marriage license had left him temporarily embarrassed. False ages were given.

Mrs. Naylor, the boy's mother, fell downstairs in her home today when informed of the wedding. She and the bride's parents were emphatic in declaring that an annulment would follow speedily.
