HIGH SCHOOLS BREAK OFF ALL RELATIONS

The Dalles and Hood River Fail to Agree on Eligibility Rules

THE DALLES, Feb. 11.—(UN)—Athletic relations between The Dalles and Hood River high schools were abruptly terminated here today and a basketball game scheduled for tomorrow night here was cancelled, following the inability of school authorities to agree on the interpretation of the eligibility code.

The Dalles officials allege that two Hood River players who took part in a contest against The Dalles two weeks ago, after having been protested, are ineligible and cannot play here tomorrow night.

Hood River officials declare the charges unwarranted and there is no board of arbitration which can be called on to act in time to save an open break between the two schools.

The next move must come from Hood River, according to local authorities who are "standing pat" on their contentions.

Y M C A Round Up Saturday Night

Members of the Central Council of the Ashland Y. M. C. A. Pioneer clubs will stage a round up in Pioneer Hall tomorrow evening it was decided at a meeting of the Council. This will be in the nature of an observance of Lincoln's birthday as well as a round up. The program is in charge of the Central Council and Rev. H. P. Pemberton will give a talk on the life of Lincoln. The meeting will start with dinner at 6:30 p. m., the eats being furnished by the different Pioneer clubs.
