Master George is a boy's boy, who loves to run about his father's stables and play in the gardens and get himself all covered with dirt. His royal mother though she may at times despair as other mothers do, has seen to that.

From his father, who is heir to one of the oldest and finest estates in England, Master George is training to be a sportsman.

Last December he was "blooded" in the hunting field. That means his handsome young face was crossed with the blood of the tail of a fox, and his tiny hands were crossed with the same blood, the sacred baptismal ceremony of the hunting field.

MODERN CRIMINALS DIFFERENT FROM OLD

Former Chicago Chief of Police Tells of Work Years Ago

QUINCY, Ill., Feb. 12.—(UP)—Frederick H. Marsh, 84, chief of police of Chicago in 1890, sits in the old soldier's home he helped found here and looks uncomprehendingly on the triumph of contemporary crime.

"It wasn't like this in the old days," he grumbles. He refers proudly to the first daylight bank robbery in Chicago. All the money was recovered and the thieves were jailed within four hours.

"Crime in those days was far different from today," says the former chief who was at one time U. S. marshal for the northern district of Illinois and a state representative. He is a veteran of the battle of Shiloh courthouse.

"Criminals were of another stripe in my time," he muses. "Old men or men in middle years were crooks I had to deal with. The old criminals would not kill if there was any way out. They'd surrender sooner than take a chance of being hung."

"The new kind kill for the fun—or the excitement. If the courts would not let criminals go the police would do their duty. There are many brave men wearing the uniform today and I have no sympathy with people who blame them for the permanent crime wave."

"Police are handicapped these days because crooks are not concentrated in a small area and they use automobiles. In my day there were regular headquarters for the criminals. We knew where to always find them and stool-pigeons told us when new ones arrived in town."

"I always treated prisoners square and they treated me square. I never lied to one."

As chief of police Marsh gave police news to two young reporters who later rose to fame. They were George Ade, the humorist and Finley Peter Dunne, orator of Mr. Dooley and Dooley's philosophy. Representing Ogde and Lee counties in the Legislature, Marsh sponsored the erection of a soldiers' home at Quincy. Now he is one of its residents.

While United States marshal, Marsh figured prominently in the amicable settlement of the switchman's strike of 1888. He said he believes his friendly treatment of the workers played a strong part in the termination of the walk-out.

PROHIBITION HEAD ISSUES WARNING

Secretary Andrews Says it Takes Nerve to Drink Liquor Here

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—"Abandon all hope ye who drink this," should be written on every bottle of whiskey sold in the United States, according to General Lincoln C. Andrews, assistant secretary of the treasury in charge of prohibition enforcement.

"I don't see how anybody in this country has the nerve to take a drink," the dry czar said today, discussing a report by Chief Medical Examiner Charles Norris, New York, on alcoholic poisoning in the metropolis.

The prohibition chief conferred with Representative Hawley, Oregon, republican, chairman of the ways and means sub-committee on drafting a special bill to meet the medicinal whiskey shortage. A bill is to be reported to the committee within a few days, it was stated.
